Hurricane Helene





Chucky Llewellyn, of **Mulberry Grove** took a load of firewood to Spruce Pine, NC. Alex Llewellyn made a trip to Vass, NC, to deliver goods and supplies for those devastated by the hurricane and flooding. She also joined the team from CVCS in delivering 4 trailers of goods, including bottled water, cleaning supplies, diapers, and baby formula. The second team went to a staging area in

North Carolina. They assisted with moving and sorting items coming in a steady stream so that it could be organized for delivery. Several church members met at CVCS to help load the trucks prior to departure. Additionally church members donated items needed. The church has sent \$1000 to BGAV Disaster Response and \$500 to the Bland Ministry Center to help those devastated by Hurricane Helene.

Fitzgerald Memorial Baptist Church and Community Team Steps Forward Rev. Steve Emory

We arrived on Monday, Sept. 30, to the site set up at Abingdon FB, we helped the Disaster Relief leaders set the working site and met other personnel. We became familiar with our duties and then met at the place we bivouacked, Highlands Community Church, around 4pm and got settled for the night.

Tuesday morning, we were up at 5am, dressed, and we're on the site around 5:45...eating a quick breakfast, and getting instructions for the day. Our entire team we preparing food for the Red Cross to deliver to the Washington County, Va site (Damascus, Va) for lunch and for Supper. We were to prepare 1,500 meals per. (3,000 meals per day).

Our work site had people from all over Virginia, my team from Cumberland consisted of 4 members (from our church), and 2 (two) from our sister churches in the JRBA. Most of our team stayed all week, a few left early to return home for work. No one is expected to stay all week. Workers come and go as they need.

Our team of 12 received our training from the VA Relief Disaster personnel (May 12, 2024) and were finally able to actually (physically) work on a site. Two of our team were yet to be certified, but that credential is accessible online. We encourage every member of the JRBA to become certified and experienced - ready for a call out.

Bland Disaster Ministry Team October 1 – 4, 2024



A small team went to assist at the Bland Ministry Center following the devastation from Hurricane Helene. Gwynn Tyler, Phyllis Tyler, and Wayne Gough, (**Mulberry Grove**), along with Joe Weaver (**Tar Wallet**), quickly responded to a request from Dee Dee Housier, Director of BMC. They arrived on Tuesday afternoon, worked Wednesday, Thursday, and until noon on Friday.

Wayne's daughter collected bottled water and toilet paper for the group to take to the center for distribution. Wayne and Joe carried chainsaws. Wayne also carried gas and generators for use as needed. Everyone pitched in with food items for the week as they were unsure of exactly what the conditions would be at Bland. The center and volunteer house did have electricity, though many of the staff and thousands in the area were still without power.

Gwynn, Wayne, and Joe worked throughout the area, doing chainsaw work and clearing brush in the wake of the hurricane on several properties. They were able to clear a tree from the roof of one house as well. They also assisted with transporting food/goods to one of the local shelters. Phyllis kept the volunteer house open for clients and staff members to come for showers and to do laundry. She also cooked hot meals for the team and some of the BMC staff. The group also provided encouragement to the staff and regular volunteers who were working diligently to help those in the area who came for assistance. The BMC staff and local volunteers continued the regular food and clothing distributions for the week. The group appreciated the prayers and monetary support from JRBA.

JRBA Quarterly Executive Board Meeting

October 14, 2024

Marilyn Snoddy, Moderator, opened the JRBA Quarterly Executive Board Meeting with devotional thoughts on John 11 entitled, "Do You Believe This?" After Lazarus died and was in the tomb four days, Jesus arrived on the scene. Martha went out to meet him and told him, "If you had been here, my brother would not have died. But I know that even now God will give you whatever you ask." ...Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me will live, even though he dies; and whoever lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" "Yes,

Lord," she told him, "I believe that you are the Christ, the Son of God, who was to come into the world." This and many other things that happened in the Bible seem unbelievable...think about the creation

of the world in six days, Noah building the ark and taking his family and the animals inside, Daniel in the lions' den, Jonah in the belly of the whale, the parting of the Red Sea and the Israelites crossing on dry ground, Jesus died, was buried, and rose again...ONLY by FAITH can we believe. Faith is what assures us of God's providence and power! Marilyn led us in singing I Know Whom I Have Believed and then in a prayer asking for the Lord's leading by the Holy spirit in all we do.

Marilyn called the meeting to order and Gwynn Tyler had the roll call of churches. There were 17 in attendance, representing 9 churches. The new Office Manager, Jennifer Hellerstedt, was also in attendance. The minutes of the July 8, 2024 Executive Board Meeting were presented and approved.

OFFICERS' REPORTS:

Rev. Austin Williams, Treasurer, presented the Quarterly Financial Report. The checkbook balance as of September 30, 2024 was \$29,159.76. This

total included the Additional Missions Fund (\$100), Mission Trips (\$650), Mission Blitz (\$648.52), Bland Ministries (\$100), Christian Education/Training/Evangelism (\$35.00) and Baccalaureates (\$150.00). Total Receipts for the quarter were \$8,910.39 which included Church

Contributions (\$4,069.58), Individual Contribution (\$100), Interest (\$5.19), Rise Against Hunger (\$4,635.62), and Bland Ministry Center (\$100). Total

Disbursements were \$19,515.29 which included Mission Trip (Bland Disaster Response - \$100), and Rise Against Hunger (\$13,039.67). The Checking Account Balance was \$43,361.76 with Outstanding Checks totaling \$14,202.00. The CD Balance as of June 30, 2024 was \$10,601.14. The report was approved. Austin also noted than an additional \$500 came in for Rise Against Hunger and will be carried over for next year's event.

BUDGET:

OVERALL PROPOSED BUDGET: \$28,541.00, representing an increase in the actual budget of \$571.00 Changes included:

MISSIONS: Additional Missions was raised from \$500 to \$800 to reinstate a yearly donation of \$100 each to Piedmont Habitat for Humanity, Gideons International, and BGAV Disaster Response. Rise Against Hunger was also reinstated in the budget (\$500). These changes totaled an overall increase of \$800.

OFFICE EXPENSES: Building Insurance was raised from \$435 to \$436; Technology was raised from \$750 to \$1,000; Utilities (water, Britespeed, Gas) was decreased from \$4,500 to \$3,700, as the landlord is paying the gas bill. These changes resulted in an overall decrease of \$549.

PAYROLL EXPENSES: Payroll was raised from \$12,500 to \$12,800; Custodial was raised from \$300 to \$320. Changes resulted in an overall increase of \$320.

The proposed budget was approved. (Some errors in the report have been corrected above and will be voted on at the next Executive Board Meeting. .

The total budget is the same amount as approved.)

KNIGHTS' PANTRY: There have been no changes in the account since the July meeting. There have been no additional contributions. The carryover amount is \$2,265.33.

Mrs. Betty Toney, Benevolence Chair, presented the quarterly Benevolence Report. From July 1, - September 30, 2024, no contributions were made to the fund. Disbursements of \$520.85 included \$200 on an overdue electric bill, and \$320.85 contributed to individuals who lost their belongings in a house fire. Available funds stand at \$5,862.68.

Marilyn Snoddy then gave the Moderator's Report. She mentioned what a busy year it was for JRBA. She noted her ending her service as Moderator and how much she had enjoyed working with friends through the years in serving the Lord and building the

Kingdom. She noted the packing of 25,000 meals for Rise Against Hunger in 2023 and the huge turnout of volunteers at that event! Even though this year's event drew only 102 volunteers, everyone worked hard and completed the task of packing 31,156 meals. She noted how hard the children worked and the enthusiasm they showed.

Marilyn noted some other ministries of JRBA during the 2023-2024 year and thanked everyone for their participation.:

- Hope for Appalachia Winter Wear Campaign and Mission Trip, including Kindergarten and Pre-K bags, cookies for the teachers, and the spring boxes for the students; Mission Team led by Rev. Woody Moore
- Bland Mission Team led by Gwynn and Phyllis Tyler in the spring
- Supporting other participants in various mission trips
- First Annual Youth Explosion reaching out to area youth with the Gospel

Marilyn thanked Mulberry Grove for hosting the 189th Annual Fall Meeting and Tar Wallet for hosting the 190th Semi-Annual Spring Meeting. She noted the retirement of Secretary Phyllis Tyler on June 15, who was honored at the spring meeting.

Marilyn also noted the formation of a Personnel Committee with Gwynn Tyler serving as Chairman. The committee was tasked with finding a JRBA Office Manager. Jennifer Hellerstedt was hired and began work on September 4, 2024.

She prays that 2024-2025 will give us continuing opportunities to accomplish much for the Kingdom, with the Lord's help, for without Him, we could do nothing.

WMU Quarterly Report: Mrs. Betty Toney noted that members of the Leadership Team attended WMUV's 150th Anniversary at CrossRoads for a wonderful day of worship, inspiration, special guests, and history. They especially enjoyed the "Walk Through History Fashion Hour" that was narrated by Claudia Hatfield.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Nominating Committee: In the absence of Rita Harris, the moderator presented the updated Slate of Officers.

Rev. Robert Silby has accepted the roll of Vice Moderator and Robert Spiers has agreed to be the Disaster Response Coordinator. The added officers were approved.

Program Committee: The Program draft was presented for the Annual Fall Meeting to be held on October 17, 2024, at Sharon Baptist Church. Rev.

Dane Gressett will bring the message and the Sharon Baptist Choir and Jennifer Farrish will present Special Music. Gloria Newton will talk about the Youth Explosion. The committee recommended that the offering be taken for the Bland Ministry Center. All recommendations of the Program Committee were approved.

Missions Committee:

Rev. Jimmy Dunn thanked everyone who participated in the Rise Against Hunger Meal packing on October 13, and thanked Maysville Baptist for their participation and providing the facility for the event. He noted that the 31,156 meals will go to the Philippines to provide school lunches to approximately 140 students for a year. Rev. Dunn noted that just as we work together to feed hungry children, we should work together, regardless of our differences, for the Glory of God. Rev. Steve Emery told about the September 30 Disaster Response Team that went to Abington, VA, to help the BGAV Disaster Response Feeding Team provide meals to victims of Hurricane Helene in Damascus, VA. They provided about 500 meals per day which were delivered by the Red Cross. Steve also noted that BGAV is collecting Flood Buckets for victims of the storm. Go to www.bgav.org to see information on how to provide a filled flood bucket or on how to donate \$75 to pay for one. If you choose to make your own, they are being collected at Heritage **Baptist**

(Farmville) or Fork Union Baptist (Fork Union). Rev. Jimmy Dunn also talked about a group from FBC going to Damascus with SBCV

Response. Another group is going later as well and carry supplies. Gwynn Tyler told about the team that went to Bland Ministry Center Oct. 1-4, to help at the center and in the surrounding area where a great deal of wind damage occurred and loss of power was widespread for a lengthy period following the hurricane. The men did chainsaw work and cleared debris while the volunteer house remained open for those needing showers or laundry facilities. From Mulberry Grove, Chuck Llewellyn took a load of firewood to NC, and Alex Llewellyn made two trips to NC carrying supplies, the second trip with the

CVCS group that took 4 trailers of items to assist victims. Additionally, the Mt. Zion GA's went shopping for items to send to victims with the Cartersville Baptist group. Clarence Gormus noted that Randy Waycaster (Cedar) took a trailer load of supplies, including hay for cattle, to NC. Our people continue to respond to the needs of others in generosity with God's love! Austin noted that if you are going on a Disaster Relief trip, be sure to send in your name and address ahead of the trip for financial assistance from JRBA. The dates for the Hope for Appalachia Fall Trip are Dec. 4 – 7, 2024. Items being collected: Coats, Hats, Gloves, Scarves, Individual Blankets, Kindergarten and Pre-K Bags, and cookies for the teachers/staff. The items need to be delivered to the Mt. Zion Mission

House by October 30. If you need to set up a time to deliver items, text Marilyn at 434-808-9235, or call her at 434-581-3957. If you are ordering items from Amazon, you can have them shipped to her.

Personnel Committee: Gwynn Tyler noted the committee's work over the summer and the hiring of Jennifer Hellerstedt as Office Manager. He noted that the office is open on Monday and Wednesday, from 9 AM – 5PM, except on holidays. He thanked the members of the committee for their time and input. He then presented the new Office Policy Manual, developed by the committee, with guidelines for the management of the office and hiring of employees. The Policy Manual was approved as presented.

OLD BUSINESS:

Introduction of Office Manager: Marilyn Snoddy introduced Jennifer and asked her to share a bit with the board members. Jennifer told us about growing up in Buckingham, the daughter of Rev. Otis and Nyoka Whorley. She noted that she had been retired from Law Enforcement work for 5 years and cared for her parents until their passing. She lost them and her mother-in-law during the last year. Grieving their loss, she felt it was time to pursue some kind of work. Thelma Childress told her about the JRBA position and encouraged her to apply. She interviewed and was hired. She asked for everyone's patience and prayers. Marilyn encouraged everyone to go by the office and get to know Jennifer.

New Business:

Marilyn presented a letter from Tar Wallet Baptist Church notifying JRBA of their withdrawal from JRBA. Rev. Jimmy Dunn asked that a letter of regretful acceptance be sent to Tar Wallet, acknowledging their faithful participation through the years in mission work.

Rev. Austin Williams presented a Financial Request for permission to obtain Debit Cards (through PEX Cards) to provide limited funds for those who need to purchase items for specific JRBA events or for Jennifer to utilize for JRBA office supplies/postage/etc. The service is free for up to 5 debit cards. A motion was made, seconded and approved for Austin to obtain the cards.


Rev. Austin Williams made a motion to adjourn. It was seconded and Rev. Jimmy Dunn closed the meeting with prayer.

Forty-five messengers, pastors, visitors and kitchen helpers were at Sharon Baptist on October 17, 2024, for the 190th Annual Fall Meeting of the James River Baptist Association. Terry Ludovissy, Sharon's pianist, opened the service with a beautiful Prelude, after which Marily Snoddy, Moderator and Music Director, led the singing of *How Great Thou Art*. Robert Noble gave the Welcome and read the theme verse, Il Chronicles 7:14: *If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then will I hear from heaven and will forgive their sin and will heal their land. Robert noted how appropriate the verse is during this time in our country. Marilyn Snoddy called the meeting to order and Gwynn Tyler had the Roll Call of Churches. (The meeting started off with light attendance due to an accident on Route 20 that held up several folks, but folks continued to arrive until the fellowship dinner, prior to the Worship Service.)*

Marilyn presented the Program and it was approved. Rev. Skip Wallace brought greetings from BGAV. He expressed his excitement in being able to share. He told the story of the man at the sheepgate in Jerusalen and how Jesus healed him on the Sabbath. The Pharisees were upset with him, but Jesus did what needed to be done, even on the Sabbath! He used this as an example of how God is always at work. The Son does what the father does! He noted that JRBA has lots of ministries. MISSIONS COMMITTEE:

Rev. Jimmy Dunn spoke about the Rise Against Hunger Meal Packing Event held on October 17, noting that it was a great start to a year of serving others and working together. He asked that everyone pray that as an Association we can always continue to reach out and help those in need. He acknowledged that our churches are helping with Disaster Response and will continue to do so. We continue to reach out to those in need in Kentucky through Hope for Appalachia. He reminded everyone to be thankful for opportunities to serve others in Jesus' name. He noted that Bland Ministry Center is another opportunity to be the hands and feet of Jesus and encouraged everyone to give generously to this ministry.

Gwynn Tyler briefly told about the recent mission trip to the Bland Mission Center in response to devastation caused by Hurricane Helene. Not only were team members able to help people needing assistance, but they were able to encourage the regular volunteers and the center's staff.

Although she will not be an officer, we look forward to continuing to work with her in our continuing ministry.

SPOTLIGHT ON MISSIONS: YOUTH EXPLOSION 2024

Due to technical difficulties, no pictures were shown from the 2024 Youth Explosion, but Gloria Newton shared a bit about the event. She recognized all individuals who served on the Youth Explosion committee who planned the event and worked hard to see that it went well. She also recognized all the churches that were involved with the event. She thanked Marilyn for her persistence and help in making preparations. She noted some things that can be done to improve the event next year. She said, "If we do what the Lord says, the event will be successful." Next year's event will be May 30 – 31, so start talking to young people now. Call JRBA if you want to serve on the committee and be involved in planning this outreach to the youth of our area.

Robert Noble closed out the business session with Romans 15:13: May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace as you trust in him, so that you may overflow with hope by the power of the Holy Spirit. He then led us in the Benediction and Blessing for the meal.

Those in attendance adjourned to the fellowship hall for a delicious meal and good fellowship around the table.

The evening Worship Service began with a Prelude, followed by the Invocation by Rev. Steve Emery. Everyone joined in singing, *Sweet Hour of Prayer*. Then Rev. Jimmy Dunn installed the 2024 - 2025 Officers in attendance. He encouraged the officers to do their very best and to work for the Lord. He prayed for the Officers and the work of the Association. He also called up Rev. Woody Moore, Team Leader, and others involved in the Hope for Appalachia work. Woody said that he is the only one going on the Fall Trip from JRBA, but he is appreciative of all those who work here to make what he does possible and for providing what is needed in this outreach ministry. Rev. Dunn encouraged the group with Scripture and the reminder to serve others in Jesus' love and Spirit. He then prayed for the group.

The offertory hymn, *Grace That Is Greater Than Our Sin*, was led by Marilyn Snoddy. Doug Tapscott told about his own special connection with the Bland Ministry Center through the years and gave the Offertory Prayer. An offering of \$693.00 was collected for the Bland Ministry Center.

Special Music was then provided by the Sharon Baptist Choir. They beautifully shared *Jesus Christ, My Living Hope* and *Bless the Lord, O My Soul.* Jennifer Farrish also sang, *I Believe*. All of the music was soothing and inspirational, touching our hearts.

Rev. Dane Gressett, Pastor, Jones Chapel, commented on the choir's beautiful voices and on the special beauty of such an old church that has served God in this community for so many years. What a privilege to worship within its walls. Dane shared II Chronicles 7:11 – 14 and noted that this passage is so appropriate for this time of year when revivals and elections ("deciding" times) are taking place. The passage is taking place after the dedication of the temple built by Solomon. Fire fell on the people – the Glory of God! God spoke to Solomon about the backsliding of Isreal that is to come. Isreal has had repeated times of doubt and backsliding throughout its history. Moses himself didn't get in to the Promised Land. Solomon built the temple, but didn't finish well – he had many wives and built temples to other gods! So here we are, some of us in the later stages of life and we NEED to finish well. Many Bible stories and parables of Jesus are about folks finishing well. The book of Hebrews if about persevering, enduring, finishing well. So just what does it mean to finish with fullness – finish well? Does it just mean to end up in heaven? Heaven IS a glorious promise, but Paul isn't just talking about going to heaven, but rather to look like Jesus when we get there! We should be allowing Jesus to transform us now. We don't want to finish with resentment, anger, bitterness, etc. We want to get there looking like our Lord. Philippians 1:6 says, Being confident of this, that he who began a good work in you will carry it on to completion until the day of Jesus Christ.

Jeus died for us so he could live IN and THROUGH us. We need to learn to live in the spirit of God. We don't make promises to God – He makes promises to us. Where we will fail, Jesus will succeed. Once we have accepted Jesus, the game is changed. Greater is He that is in you, than he that is in the world. Don't live "for" Jesus, rather, allow him to live in us and be willing to humble yourself and accept His spirit. So...

- ❖ We need to operate with God in us, partnering now with the grace of the Gospel. We are saved one by one, individually coming to faith and knowing that God never leaves us. We are planted in the house of the Lord and can flourish in the grace of Christ. (Eph.4:14 − 16) We are connected to the body of Christ and need a vital relationship with other Christians. Each of the parts of the body is needed and must do its job for the body to be effective. We need to have unity and purpose in magnifying God. If we are not connected, we miss out on the fellowship of the body. We cannot finish with fullness without the grace of Christ.
- We need to flow in His love. Philippians 1:9-10, And this is my prayer; that your love may abound more and more in knowledge and depth of insight, so that you may be able to discern what is best and may be pure and blameless until the day of Christ. Paul wanted the Philippians to continually grow in love so that they could live as blameless as possible until they met Jesus. We know from I Corinthians 13, that everything is nothing without love. We need to love one another more and more just as Christ loved us. Without love, we cannot grow in knowledge and discernment. Without love, we grieve the spirit. Each of us is only responsible for what we do and what we think. We need to ask God to remove any bitterness he wants to change ME not me change others or the church. Our goal should be to become more like Jesus every day! God is more concerned with who we are becoming than in what we are doing.

Dane then shared how his father, a strong Christian throughout his life, had a brain hemorrhage that left him with some disabilities, one being the inability to read as he had before. He didn't understand why it happened and was mad at God. He learned to do things new ways, including listening to the Bible and other books and he "came back", believing that his most fruitful days were yet to come. But he passed away – why? God wanted to get to more things in His heart! When he faced Jesus, there was not controversy – he finished with fullness. Each of us needs to lean into Jesus – with Jesus dwelling in your soul, experiencing and sharing His grace, and caring for one another. We need one another and must operate in love! Dane closed with a prayer of blessing of peace, love and grace on each of our lives. To God be the Glory!

Marilyn led us in the closing hymn, *Take Time To Be Holy*, and Gwynn Tyler closed the service with prayer. What a wonderful time of inspiration and fellowship in the house of the Lord!
